

**EMU TRACK & FIELD
HISTORY**

Much of the Parks era historical section, is taken from Coach Parks' book. This section would not have been as complete without his help or his book.

The Eastern Michigan University men's track and field program is rich in tradition and it all began in 1905. Now in its 103rd year, the Eagles have racked up a number of accomplishments in that time span. The Green and White have had 56 Division I All-Americans, 27 Division II All-Americans and 40 NAIA All-Americans.

THE COACHES

A track team begins with the coach and Eastern Michigan has only seen four men walk through the door and lead the EMU track squads.

Lloyd Olds began the winning tradition for the men and coached from 1922-41. During his tenure, the men from Ypsi won 85 percent of their meets.

George Marshall succeeded Olds in 1941 and served for 26 years and helped bring EMU its first national championship (1966 NAIA cross country crown). He is best remembered for molding sprinter **Hayes Jones** into an Olympic hurdler. He was also at the helm when the Hurons upset defending Big Ten champion Indiana in an indoor dual meet in 1958. He held the post through the 1966 cross country season before **Bob Parks** was named the head man in January of 1967.

In 34 years at the helm of the Eastern Michigan track and field program, Parks led the Hurons to 31 Mid-American conference titles in track and cross country, 13 MAC invitational titles (indoor MAC championship prior to being sanctioned in 1996) and nine NAIA/ Division II titles. He had 286 MAC and Central Collegiate Champions, 31 NAIA/NCAA Champions and earned 26 MAC Coach of the Year honors and eight NCAA Regional Coach of the Year honors. His runners also made their mark on the ultimate international track stage, the Olympic Games, where 10 of his athletes made 16 appearances in the Olympics. Former EMU great **Hasely Crawford** won the Gold Medal in the 100-meter dash at the 1976 Olympics for Trinidad-Tobago and former Eastern standout **Earl Jones** won the Bronze Medal in the 800-meter run for the United States in the 1984 Olympics. Parks announced his retirement 33 years later and retired following the 2000 cross country season and long time assistant **Brad Fairchild** took over from there and continues the winning tradition.

In just seven seasons, Fairchild has continued the winning ways of the Eagle track program. His teams have won three MAC outdoor titles and six indoor titles, and he has been named coach of the year a total of

nine times.

THE OLYMPIANS

Eastern has not only been successful at the collegiate level, but also at the international level. The Green and White have had nine athletes reach the highest stage 15 times. It all began back in the 50's with **Hayes Jones**.

While at Eastern, Jones earned two NCAA hurdles titles in 1959 in the 120-yard high hurdles and the 220 intermediate hurdles. He set a consecutive hurdle and dash win streak of 56. He was the first American to appear in the initial five meets with the Soviet Union from 1959-63, was a National AAU indoor champion hurdler in 1959-64, National AAU outdoor champion for three years, set 23 records and was the high scorer in four consecutive Interstate Intercollegiate Athletic Conference championship meets.

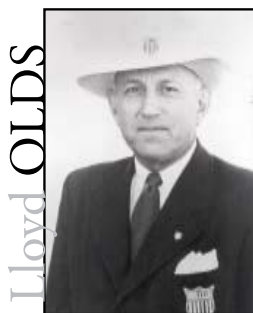
His first trip to the Olympics was the 1960 Games in Rome where he earned the Bronze Medal. In 1964 in Tokyo, Jones finished at the top, taking home the Gold Medal in the 110-meter hurdles.

One of the great distance runners for the Green and White was Canadian **Dave Ellis**. Ellis was a member of the track and cross country teams from 1967-71. Not only was he successful on the cross country course, but he also won NAIA titles in the two-mile in both 1969 and 1970 and was second in the two-mile at the 1968

NAIA indoor championships. In outdoor track, he won four NAIA individual titles; in the 5,000-meters indoors in 1968, the three-mile and six-mile in 1969 and the six-mile in 1971. He helped EMU win five NAIA track titles and was named an NAIA All-American 12 times. He competed in the 1968 Olympic Games in Mexico City for Canada where he was in the finals of the 10,000-meter run and also ran in the 5,000-meters.

Tony Nelson had a short but rewarding career at Eastern. In 1972, he placed in the indoor CCC 60-yard high hurdles and was fourth in the NCAA Outdoor Division II 110-meter high hurdles. In 1973, he was third in the indoor CCC 60-yard hurdles, won the outdoor MAC 120-yard hurdles and placed in the Outdoor CCC 120-yard hurdles. In winning the MAC Outdoor hurdles in 1973, he broke the conference record running 13.9. He competed for Canada in the 1972 Olympics. In 1976, he was injured and served as a business manager for the Olympics.

Hasely Crawford was a three-year letterman at Eastern Michigan's winning 400-yard relay team at the 1975 MAC Championship and won the individual title in the 100-yard sprint. He was a two-time NCAA champion sprinter, winning the 60-yard dash indoors in 1975 and then the 100-yard dash at the



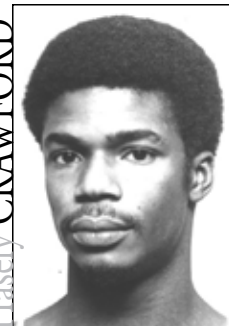

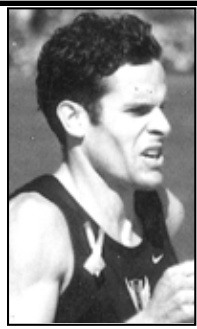


EMU's most recent Olympian, competing in the high jump. He just missed out on a medal, finishing fourth, going 7-08.00, a personal-best.

1976 NCAA Outdoor Championship. On the international stage, Crawford competed for his native country, Trinidad-Tabago. He competed in four Olympics

He was a member of the 1993 indoor 3,200-meter relay team that won the NCAA title and beat out the defending Champions in the race, the University of Florida. His post-collegiate career saw him win the 1995 National title in the 1,500-meters and win the 1996 U.S. Olympic trials in the same event. He was also ranked number one in both the mile and 1,500-meters in 1996 and in 2001. At the Olympic Games in Atlanta, he finished 19th overall. In 1998, he won the mile at the National Indoor Championships.

between 1972-84 and took home the Gold Medal in the 100-meter dash in 1976.

Earl Jones was an outstanding track and cross country runner for EMU from 1982-85. Jones won two MAC 800 meter championships outdoors and captured three MAC 1,500 meter titles and ran on two winning 1600-meter relay teams. He also won other numerous titles in the Central Collegiate Conference, both indoors and outdoors. He was a five-time NCAA All-American in track with a second place the 1,500 meter run in the 1983 NCAA outdoor championship, a runner-up spot in the 800 meters at the 1984 outdoor meet and as a member of the winning distance medley relay team at the 1984 NCAA indoor championship. He won two NCAA titles, the indoor and outdoor 800 meters in 1985. Jones went on to earn a bronze medal in the 800-meter run at the 1984 Olympic Games in Los Angeles.

Behind Earl Jones, **Tommy Asinga** is one of the best 800-meter runners in school history and still owns the third-best time. He competed in two Olympics, in 1988 and 1992, for his native Suriname and was the flag bearer for his country in the 1992, Olympic opening ceremonies. Asinga also competed at the 1996 Olympic Games

Paul McMullen may be one of the greatest middle-distance runners Eastern has ever seen. He was an eight-time NCAA Division I All-American and 10-time MAC Champion.

1994 seventh place NCAA DMR; 1994 indoor 800 meters, and 1995 outdoor 800 meters). He ran in the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta for British West Indies despite being a U.S. citizen (his father was born in the British West Indies). At the Olympics, he ran the 800 meters and was a member of the 1,600-meter relay.

Clement Chukwu was an outstanding sprinter for the Eagles. At the 1998 indoor MAC Championship, he ran the fastest time in the world in the 400 meters, setting an EMU varsity record at 45.37. In 1999, he won the 400 meters at the NCAA Championship in a time of 44.79, which is an EMU record and the fastest ever by a state of Michigan collegian. In 1998, he set a school record of 20.30 in the 200 meters and ran 10.38 in the 100 meters in 1999. He tallied nine total individual MAC titles along with several relays. He won a silver medal at the 2000 Olympics in Sydney, on the 1,600-meter relay team for Nigeria as the lead-off runner.

Fabian Rollins was another outstanding sprinter for the Eagles who had the misfortune of running at the same time as another EMU great (Chukwu). He never won an individual MAC title for the Eagles, finishing second to Chukwu most of the time, but was part of several championship winning relays. A two-time All-American, Rollins ran in the 2000 Olympic games for Barbados, running in the 400 and the 4x100-meter relay.

Jamie Nieto was a transfer from Sacramento Junior College, competing for the Eagles from 1997-99. He earned All-American honors in 1999 at the indoor NCAA Championships with a jump of 7-06.00. Nieto competed for the United States in the 2004 Olympics in Athens. He won the Olympic trials, leaping 7-07.75. In Athens, he just missed taking home a medal, finishing fourth, clearing 7-08.00.

MAC CHAMPIONS

EMU trackmen have been around for 103 years but have only been in the Mid-American Conference for the past 36 years and in that time they have tallied 31 MAC Championship titles in indoor and outdoor track.

Although indoor track has been run for years in the MAC, they had not begun awarding an official indoor championship until 1996. Since then, the Green and White have claimed 11 of those 12 titles since its inception, winning nine straight from 1996-2004. The first seven years of the MAC Invite, the indoor championship prior to 1996, scores were not kept. The score was kept from 1981 on and the Eagles won 13 titles in 15 years before the MAC sanctioned the meet in 1996.

The Eagles are one of only two schools in the conference to have claimed the triple crown (winning cross country, indoor and outdoor titles in one school year) and they have done so a total of three times (2000-01, 2001-02, 2006-07). Central Michigan University is the only other team to do so (2004-05).

Outdoors, the Eagles have been just as successful. The Eagles have the most MAC outdoor titles in the conference, with 20.

1974 Outdoor: The 1974 Hurons were without Olym-





pian **Hasely Crawford**, who had foot surgery after the indoor season and only in their second year of competition in the MAC.

Gordon Minty won the six mile run, keeping the pace slow in the blistering 90 degree weather, winning in a time of 29:30.90. **Stan Vinson** finished third in the triple jump with only one attempt, as he had not competed in the event since the year before. He held off the nearest competitor by 3/4 of an inch.

The Hurons regained some momentum when Vinson roared into a MAC record time of 46.2 to win the 440-yard dash. **Carlos Woods** won the 100 in 9.6 with **Clarence Chapman** finished fourth and was also third in the long jump, going 23-02.50. **Steve Taylor** cleared 15-06 and got a needed third in the pole vault and **Peter Bauls** (1:51.7) and **Phil Combs** (1:54.4) were second and sixth in the 880 for the Green and White.

Still trailing, the Hurons got 15 big points from Minty, who won the mile and **Nick Ellis** and **Dave Burkhart**, who finished fourth and sixth, respectively. The only chance to win the title was if the Hurons won the mile relay. **Kim Travis**, **Mike Arnold** and **Bill Soens** put Vinson close enough and the feared anchorman came from behind to beat Bowling Green at the finish with a 45.8 leg. Their time was a seasonal best 3:13.90 and with only the discus to be concluded, the Green and White were within range of winning the team title.

When it really counted, **Ron Duncan** and **Jim Wetenhall** (who had earlier placed sixth in the hammer) both unleashed personal-best-throws on their final attempts to place 1-3 and score 16 points for the Hurons. Duncan's mark of 167-1 held up as an EMU varsity record until 2003 and Wetenhall had a toss of 157-11. The Hurons won with 123 points to BG's 120. WMU was third with 109, followed by Kent State 97, Ohio 59, Miami 43, Northern Illinois 35, CMU 26, Ball State 25 and Toledo 14. Coach Parks was voted Coach of the Year.

1977 Outdoor: The 1977 MAC win was an exciting one. **Tom Korpall** pulled a muscle in the 100 meters, the first event of the decathlon, but insisted on doing the whole grind anyway, a gutsy performance which inspired his teammates. After the first two days, the Hurons were in last place with only six points, while arch-rival Western Michigan, was far ahead with 30. The Green and White won all three preliminary heats in the 100 and 200 meters, and then did the same thing in the finals, going 1-2-3 in both sprints, the first such slam in its brief MAC meet history. **Russell Bailey** (10.53; 21.19), **Bruce Taylor** (10.62;

21.46), and **Ken Delor** (10.67; 21.55) also joined forces with **Eric Williams** to win the 4x100-meter relay in 40.50 seconds, a varsity, MAC and stadium record and an NCAA qualifying time. Russell's time was an NCAA qualifying time as well. The Hurons also picked up three places in the 110-meter hurdles with **Jeff Dils** (14.29, third), **Ed Taylor** (14.42, fourth), and **Gary Ramsey** (14.88, sixth). Dils came back with a big PR of 51.78 seconds for second in the 400-meter hurdles and anchored the 1,600-meter relay team to a second place finish in a time of 3:12.6. They got some other key places such as: **Ed Grabowski**-third in the steeplechase-9:01.24; **Steve Elliott**-tie for third in the high jump-6-08.00; **Ernie Demarse**-fourth in the discus-151-11; **Maurice Weaver**-fourth in the 1,500 meters-3:52.95; **Ben Gibson**-third in the 400 meters-47.96; and **Mike Arnold**-fifth in the 800 meters-1:53.05.

The pole vault was an exciting competition with the Hurons' **Wes Teeple** and **Nat Durham** locking horns with OU's Roger Gilders, the son of the Ohio swimming coach and the former national high school indoor record holder in the vault. Gilders won on fewest misses with Durham second and Teeple third. One way or another, EMU won the meet, scoring 126 to OU's 99.5, Miami's 86.5, WMU's 83, BG's 60, CMU's 56, Ball State's 54, Kent State's 41, Toledo's 27, and Northern Illinois' 18.

It was announced at the MAC banquet that EMU's **Jim Deren** was EMU's scholar-athlete of the year and Coach Parks got his second MAC Coach of the Year award.

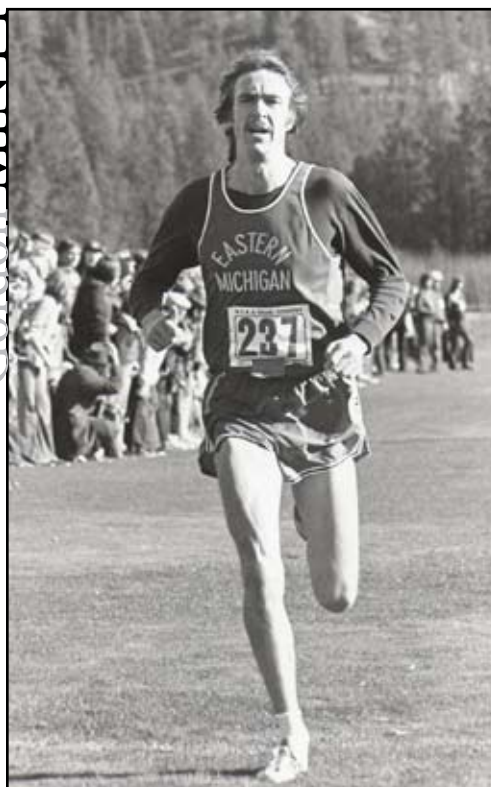
1978 Outdoor: **Russell Bailey**, the defending champion in both sprints hurt his leg at West Virginia and re-injured it at Penn, but was eager to give it a try. **Terry Thames** injured his leg against Toledo and was questionable. Eastern had earlier lost distance runner, **John Schulze**; high jumper, **Steve Elliott**; decathlete, **Tom Korpall**; 800 meter man, **Craig Gully**; hurdler, **Ed Taylor** and long and triple jumper, **Ray Washington** due to injuries or other eligibility issues. This group alone would likely beat half of the teams in the meet.

On day one, the Hurons took 2-4-6 in the 10,000 meters, with **Roger Jones** (30:58.02), **Scott Ferguson** (31:05.40) and **Rick Fethke** (31:41.19). Jones blistered up so badly that he wasn't able to run in the 5,000 meters on Saturday. **Gary Bastien** won the decathlon with a MAC and varsity record and NCAA qualifying mark of 7,210.

The Hurons qualified three men for the finals in the 100, 200, 400, 1,500 and high hurdles and two in the 800 and 400 hurdles.

On Saturday it rained hard and was cold and EMU had

some bad exchanges in the 4x100-meter relay, which put the Hurons in a hopeless situation chasing Ohio in the relay. Russell was gaining on them and in a solid second place, when he pulled his leg muscle again and went down on the track. He was out of the meet and they didn't score in the relay.

It didn't take long for them to get rolling and make up for Bailey's absence. In the 1,500, the Hurons took 2-3-4 behind Western's Tom Duits as **Mike Helms** (3:48.27) and **Kevin Young** (3:49.16) both got PR's and **Maurice Weaver** clocked 3:50.07. In the 100, **Ken Delor** and **Howard Mitchell** went 3-4 in 10.62 and 10.72, respectively. The same two came back to go 2-3 in the 200 in 21.46 and 21.57.

According to coach Parks, **Billy Ray** was worried about drawing lane eight in the 400, but told him it was a great place to be, and he evidently believed him because he ran a big time PR of 47.92, placing second, ahead of

teammates **Tony Cadogan** (48.26-fifth) and **Ben Gibson** (48.39-sixth). **Jeff Dils** led a 1-4-5 finish in the 110 hurdles at 13.94 (**Gary Ramsey**, 14.38-fourth and **Kevin Jackson**, 14.45-fifth). Dils then came back with a second place finish in the 400 hurdles with Jackson third, both hitting PR's of 51.08 and 52.63, respectively.

Eastern turned in a fourth and sixth in the 800 with Weaver (1:50.48) and **Jerry Wojtala** (1:51.90) and Grabowski came back to place sixth in the 5,000 in a time of 14:43.36. **Ernie Demarse** finished second in the discus at 152-11 and the mile relay team of Gibson, Cadogan, Ray, and Dils was second in a time of 3:12.29.

When the rain hit, the pole vault and high jump were moved into nearby Finch Field House and went on well after the meet, which ended with a sunny day outside. **Tim Doyen** qualified for the NCAA meet as he cleared a PR of 7-01.00, placing third and **Jim Lotan** (16-00.00) and **Wes Teeple** (15-06.00) were 2-3 in the vault. The Hurons won the meet easily with 156 points with Central finishing second with 106 points.

1982 Outdoor: The Green and White had a slow start at the 1982 conference meet. On the second day **Mark Smith** and **Scott Millis** went 1-2 in the steeplechase (8:47.19 and 8:51.66, respectively) but not much else went right. Millis' time was 14 seconds better than his previous best. Parks had decided not to run Smith in the 10,000, saving him for the steeple and 5,000. It turned out to be a good move. EMU failed to place in the hammer, shot put and long jump. Eastern came out of the second day in third place with 38 points behind the leader, Miami,

which was leading with 62 points. **Tim O'Hare**, the 1980 MAC champ, fell while leading in his preliminary heat of the 100 hurdles on the wet and slippery track, but, other than that, EMU qualified pretty well on the track, placing 14 men in Saturday's finals.

The first two days belonged to the Redskins, but the last day was all Eastern Michigan. Once the Green and White clad warriors got untangled it was all over. Miami never knew what hit them.

In the field events, they got 21 points with **Darwin Scott** taking third in the javelin at 214-3.50, **Bob Higgins** sixth in the discus at 159-10 and **Jim Lotan** and **Walt Mills** second and third, respectively, in the pole vault at 15-05.75 and 15-02.00, behind Ward of Miami, an 18 foot vaulter who had already won the decathlon.

The races started off Saturday with a clutch win in the 400-meter relay. **Anthony Bell**, **Terry Thomas**, **Daryl Curry** and **Dave Phillips** won in 41.01, their best and a MAC record. They came from behind to win over Ohio.

Next came the 1,500 and **Erik Henriksen** demolished the field as he took first in a time of 3:46.78 with teammate **Scott Millis** following in third with 3:49.22. With O'Hare out of the 100 hurdles and **Paul Bialowicz** falling on the first barrier, **Ted Keating** had to do it himself, and he did, placing second in a big upset, in 14:54.

Dave Phillips was the defending champion in the 100, but had not been running particularly well. He came to run in this one, however, placing a

close second in 10.76. He had not even won his preliminary heat. He traded wins with Kent State's Thomas Jefferson, a sophomore, who later would be the 1984 Olympic bronze medallist in the 200 at Los Angeles.

In the 400, **Terry Thomas**, who also hadn't won his heat, ran a PR by almost a second, clocking 46.84 and taking second while **Mike Calhoun** ran 47.80 for fifth place. **Jim McGrath** messed up his steps on the last hurdle, but hung on for second in the 400 hurdles with a PR of 51.87. The Hurons, who had been far behind going into the final day, were closing the gap fast. Henriksen ran a PR 1:48.72 in the 800 for a close second behind McIntosh, with Lezovich also getting a PR of 1:50.70 in fifth place.

The 200 really turned the tide. Phillips, who was assigned lane eight because of his loss in the prelims, broke out fast for a change and won in 21.08, a PR. Curry came on strong to clock 21.38 in third and Thomas, still tired from the 400, got fifth. With the 18 points in this event, the Hurons took the lead for good.

Miami's last chance was the 5,000, but **Mark Smith** took care of that by running away from pre-meet favorite and 10K winner, Brian Carlton, and winning in a MAC record 14:11.19 with **Craig Howe** finishing fourth in 14:28.14, a

The relay was anti-climactic, but the Hurons decided to win that one too. Thomas was lying on his back on the track, looking cross-eyed up into the sky, so they figured he wasn't ready to run. With their teammates chanting, "Green Machine, Green Machine," **Jim McGrath** came in close in 48.5, **Joe Codrington** kept it there with a PR of 46.9, **Daryl Curry** moved into the lead with 47.8, and **Mike Calhoun** held on to clock 47.7 and we won in 3:10.99. The final scores were: EMU 156, Miami 132, WMU 90, Ohio University 66, Kent State 55, Toledo 51, Bowling Green 46, Central Michigan 32, Ball State 12, and Northern Illinois 9.

1983 Outdoor: Eastern Michigan won its fifth outdoor championship and second in a row at the 1983 MAC outdoor meet at BGSU. The Hurons tallied 165 points en route to a 69-point victory over second place Miami University. The Hurons received big points in some areas, including a 1-2-4 finish in the steeplechase with **Mark Smith**, **Steve Reighard**, and **Scott Millis**. EMU finished 1-2 in the 400 and triple with **Mike Calhoun** and **David Beasley** 400 and **Eric Hartfield** and **Steve Bank** in the triple. In the 1,500, Eastern went 1-2-3 with **Earl Jones**, **Erik Henriksen**, and **Steve Reighard**, respectively. They all broke the MAC, varsity, Michigan Intercollegiate and stadium records and automatically qualified for the NCAA. It was the first 1,500 that Jones had finished during the outdoor season. Jones' mark of 3:41.53 still stands today. **Daryl Curry** had a good meet, placing fourth in the 100, second in the 200, almost beating future Olympic medalist, Thomas Jefferson of Kent State. Curry also ran on two winning relay teams. **Paul Niemi** was third in the 110 hurdles, second in the 400 hurdles and ran a leg on the 4x100-meter relay team. Coach Parks was named MAC Coach of the Year.

1984 Outdoor: The Hurons recorded the largest margin of victory in winning its third straight MAC title at the 1984 outdoor championship, scoring 194.33 points to Western Michigan's 95.33. The margin of 99 points still stands today. **Mark Smith** won a tough double, the steeplechase and 10,000, beating favored Jeff Drenth in the latter, running a PR of 29:30.73. He also finished second in the 5,000. **Dan Shamiyeh** had a good meet, placing second in the steeplechase in only his second try ever at the event. In addition, he was third in the 1,500 and fourth in the 5,000. **Earl Jones** won the 1,500, 800 and anchored the winning 4x400 team, with a come-from-behind leg. **Marvin Jenkins** and **Terry Beauford** were 1-3 in the triple jump and Beauford was also sixth in the javelin. **Joe Codrington** was third in the 800 behind Jones. **Erik Frederick** won the 400. It was a balanced team effort, as **Darrel**

Lawson and **Tom Elliott** were 2-3 in the 400 hurdles and **Kyle Cooley** was second in the decathlon. **Darron Witherspoon** was third in both sprints and **Jim Hensel** and **Anthony Abbott** were second in the pole vault and high jump, respectively. Mark Smith was named co-MVP and Coach Parks was named the MAC Coach of the Year.

1986 Outdoor: The 1986 championship was held in Oxford, Ohio. The Hurons got off to a good start on day one getting 22 points in the 10,000 meters, as **Mark Smith** won in 30:11.66. He was followed across the line by **Don Johns** (30:24.71) in second and **George Rodriguez** in fourth (31:04.33). The first day of the decathlon was also contested and **Wirt Gilliam** and **Paul Bialowicz** were third and fifth with 3,457 and 3,375, respectively.

On Friday, the Hurons had another good day, qualifying three men in the 100, 200 and 400, two in the 400 hurdles and 800 and one in the high hurdles. The prelims in the 1,500 were cancelled in favor of a final on Saturday. **Anthony Abbott** set a MAC record in the high jump at 7-02.25. He had a spirited competition with Kevin Flowers of Miami, who cleared 7-1. Abbott wished that Flowers could have kept going longer as he wanted competition in his quest for an NCAA qualifying mark. **Jeff Loria** cleared a PR 6-08.25 to take fourth on fewest misses from Guy Stockard of WMU. EMU didn't score in the hammer or long jump but **James Franklin** threw a PR of 54-00.00 to finish fourth in the shot. Eastern got 16 more big points in the steeplechase as **Mark Smith** and **Mark Brosnan** ran 1-3 in 8:48.39 (a new track record) and 9:00.01 (a PR), respectively.

Gilliam and **Terry Beauford** took 4-5 in the javelin with 199-07 and 198-05. **Eric Buckberry** and **Paul Hedemark** didn't vault as high as they had been, but still tied for fourth at 14-08.25, while Beauford (49-04.5) and **Marvin Jenkins** (48-7) were third and fifth in the triple jump, respectively.

The Hurons almost beat heavily favored WMU in the 400 relay, losing 40.79-40.80 as the team came on strong and almost nipped them at the line. **John Yates** ran a great race, hitting a PR of 3:49.80 for second in the 1,500, while **Kirk Scharich** also had one (3:51.63) in sixth. They had three athletes place in the 400. **Carl Johnson** was third (47.17), **Ed Hughes** was fourth (47.73) and **Harold Harden** was fifth (48.12), while **Terrance James** finished fifth in the 100 hurdles (14.66).

The 800 was a classic race. **Brad Horton** was running second on the backstretch of the last lap, but he got boxed and had to wait until everyone went by him before he started his charge. Horton was 10th at the start of the last turn and passed four guys on the turn. Coming down the final stretch, he was flying by people. When he moved by

Western's Brad Mora into second, Mora yelled ahead to his teammate, Tom Broekema, who was leading, "Hey, Tom, here he comes," and he was right, as Horton went by him too, and won the race in 1:51.06, to Broekema's 1:51.46.

Darron Witherspoon got out of the blocks well in the 100 meters and came on strong, just nipping Sanders of Ball State 10.56-10.57 for the title. **Willie Jenkins** (10.58) was a close third and the Green and White picked up 16 points to none for Western. The meet was all but over at this point. Jenkins took second in the 200 (21.45), "Spoon" finished third (21.48) and **Jeff Smith** was sixth (21.69), picking up 15 more points.

Darrel Bob ran a PR of 52.53 for third in the 400 hurdles, while **Paul Niemi** finished sixth with a time of 53.47. **Mark Smith** completed his "triple," by winning the 5,000 meters (14:23.12) and Johns took runner-up honors in 14:28.17, while Rodriguez was fourth in a time of 14:51.43. A total of 22 more points were added to the Green and White total and the rout was on. They added icing on the cake by taking the 1,600 meter relay with Hughes, Horton, Harden and Johnson running 3:10.00.

The Hurons ended up with 195 points to 106.5 for Western, 85.5 for Miami, 67 for Central, and 66 for Kent State, rounding out the top five. Ball State-62, Bowling Green-34, Toledo-18, and Ohio-17 were the other scores. **Mark Smith** was named Athlete of the Year, while coach Parks took home his seventh outdoor track Coach of the Year award.

1987 Outdoor: The Hurons had a challenge ahead of them as they headed to Athens, Ohio, for the MAC Championship, as Western had beaten them during dual competition earlier in the year and looked to have a strong squad at the conference championship. In Thursday's events, **Jason Oldham** ran a PR of 16-06.00 and finished second in the vault, while **Don Johns** finished third in the 10K, running 30:47.40.

On Friday, **Tom Hughes** finished second in the high jump at 6-10.00 and **Mike Meehan** tied for fourth, clearing 6-08.00. **James Franklin** snuck out a sixth place finish in the shot at 52-03.25. **Mark Brosnan** suffered a nasty fall on the opening lap of the steeplechase and had a lot of ground to make up. He made a gallant effort and did manage to place, running 9:11.16 for sixth place. Western took 1-2 with John Loviska (8:58.43) and Kurt Frazier (8:58.59), which was not a good sign, but EMU's **Craig Steen** ran a big-time PR of 9:02.84 in third.

Freshman **Morris Ellis** trailed Chuck Cook of Miami throughout the whole decathlon and needed to beat him by 13 seconds in the final event, the 1,500, in order to win. Ellis beat him by 22 seconds to win with 6715 points to the Cook's 6654. **Wirt Gilliam** had a PR of 6361 to finish in

fifth.

What was supposed to be a tight meet, didn't turn out to be. The Hurons started off with a bang, winning the 4x100 relay in a MAC record-breaking time of 40.26, as **Darron Witherspoon, Dazel Jules, Marvin Jenkins** and **Jeff Smith** got a healthy lead over Ball State and then held off the Cardinals, who tied the record of 40.50.

The next event was the 1,500 meters and **P.J. Osika** won it easily in 3:46.77, which was expected, but **John Yates** was right behind in a PR 3:47.07 and **Francisco Pena** was in fourth in another PR of 3:53.38. The Hurons had out-scored Western, 33-6, in the first two events Saturday and the rout was on. **Darrin Carpenter** won the third event of the day, the 110-meter high hurdles, in 14.13 in a mild upset and the margin increased. Carl Johnson was second in a PR 46.58 and Willie Jenkins was fourth in 47.30, in the 400 meters. Dazel Jules took care of the competition in the 100, easily, clocking 10.67 to pull away after his usual sluggish start. Witherspoon managed to pick up a sixth in 11.00.

If the meet was not already put away, the 800 meters more than did it as **Brad Horton** and Osika ran 1-2 in 1:50.17 and 1:50.26 in a tight race with WMU's Brad Mora, who had beaten them in the dual meet.

Since Johnson was one of the slower qualifiers in the 400 hurdle prelims, he was assigned to lane seven, which worked out great with his long stride. He started out reasonably slow, with a 20/15 stride pattern and kept it all the way, coming from way back, to roar by everyone in the home stretch and win going away, in a MAC re-

cord of 50.76.

The Hurons even sneaked out some field event points, placing 5-6 in the triple jump with Ellis, coming back from the grueling decathlon and **Anthony McClendon** at 46-08.5 and 46-06.00, respectively. **Wirt Gilliam** also bounced back from the decathlon, placing 4th in the javelin with 195-2.

Jules came back to win the 200 in 20.91 in a close finish with Western's Louis (21.03) with Witherspoon in sixth (21.40). Johns put some more icing on the cake with a fifth place finish in a very tough 5K field, being timed in 14:32.2. First place was only eight seconds ahead of him and sixth was 19 behind him.

The Hurons won the 1,600 meter relay with a team of **Eddie Hughes, Horton, Harold Harden** and Jenkins, in a good race against Miami, clocking in at 3:09.44, and winning by just over a second.

In the final team tallies, the Hurons had 168 to 113 for WMU, 104 for Miami, 63 for Ball State, 58 for Kent State, 44 for Bowling Green and Ohio University, 33 for CMU, and 24 for Toledo. They had nine firsts, six seconds, and

two thirds, including two MAC records and two Goldsberry track records.

1988 Outdoor: The Hurons tallied 162 points en route to a 53 point victory over second place Western Michigan at the 1988 outdoor championship in Mount Pleasant, Mich. **Dazel Jules** led the way by taking the 100 and 200, as well as running two good relay legs, one on the winning 4x100 team, which broke the MAC record with a time of 40.16. Other team members were **Wayne Boyd, Willie Jenkins** and **Chuck Wilson**. Our other firsts went to: Morris Ellis, **decathlon**; **Mark Brosnan**-steeplechase; **Tony McClendon**-triple jump; Carl Johnson-400 hurdles and **Mark Dailey**-800 meters. Dailey beat teammate, **Brad Horton** who had five straight indoor and outdoor MAC titles in the event, including a tie with Dailey indoors in 1988.

1989 Outdoor: The Hurons hosted the 1989 MAC Outdoor at Rynearson Stadium and won it easily, hitting the magic figure of 201 points, far ahead of runner-up CMU, which had 131. **Dazel Jules** won both sprints and ran on both winning relay teams and was named the co-MVP with **Morris Ellis** who won the decathlon, as well as also placing in the high jump, long jump, and triple jump individually. **Mark Dailey** successfully defended his 800 meter title and added the 1,500 as well, while **Chuck Wilson** took the 400 and anchored the winning 4x400 team. **Darnell Terry** pulled a huge upset, winning the triple jump, just ahead of teammate, **Will Harber**. **Mark Smith** won the pole vault.

1990 Outdoor: The 1990 Outdoor MAC was held in Oxford, Ohio, and the Hurons won with 197.50 to runner-up Ball State, which had 138.50. **Scott Hippen** and **Dan Liedel** went 1-2 in the steeplechase, while **Mark Dailey** and Hippen went 1-2 in the, 1,500 and Dailey came back to win the 800, while **Chuck Wilson** won the 400. EMU had a lot of second place finishes, as **Dazel Jules** lost his bid to win four straight sprint doubles, and **Morris Ellis** had the same thing happen in the decathlon. Football player **Rich Palmer** and Ellis went 2-3 in the triple jump, while **Brian Chadwick** and **Darrel Bob** finished third in the 400 hurdles. Palmer also finished fourth in the long jump, while **Tiberia Patterson** was runner-up in the 110 hurdles and **Jason Masterson** was second in the shot put. **Mark Smith** won the pole vault for the second straight year.

1991 Outdoor: The 1991 MAC outdoor meet was held in Muncie, Ind., and EMU won with 175 points to 131 for Miami and 104 for BG. **Tony Barton** celebrated his return to his home state with a win in the long jump, while **Mark Smith** took his third straight pole vault and **Dan Liedel** the won steeplechase. **Mark Dailey** won the 1,500 for the third straight year and **Tommy Asinga** won his first of four 800 meter titles. **Chuck Wilson** won his third 400 title, was fourth in the 200 and anchored the winning 4x400 team and runner up 4x100 team. **Dominic Middleton** was second behind Dailey in the 1,500 and

also placed in the 5,000. **Jason Jeske** was second in the 10,000 and fourth in the 5,000. Coach Parks was named the MAC Coach of the Year.

1992 Outdoor: The 1992 MAC Outdoor was held at Toledo and the Hurons were behind going into the final day, but pulled it out with 149.5 points to 135.5 for WMU and 129 for Miami. They pulled an upset in the 4x100 relay, winning with a time of 40.31 behind **David Benjamin, Eric Respress, Giles Davis** and **Reinaldo Santana**. **Tommy Asinga** and **Greg Rhymer** went 1-2 in the 800, while **Paul McMullen** won his first outdoor MAC title, winning the 1,500 in a close finish. **Dominic Middleton** and **Jason Jeske** went 1-2 in the 5,000, 2.9 tenths apart. The 4x400 relay team of Respress, Norton, **Carl Lowe** and Asinga ran 3:09.79, but lost to WMU, who ran six tenths faster.

1994 Outdoor: In the 1994 MAC outdoor at Ohio, the Eagles won with 169 points, to 117 for Miami and 110.5 for Kent State. They went 1-2-3 in the 1,500 with **Paul McMullen, Jason Boothroyd,** and **Greg Rhymer** and in the 800 with **Tommy Asinga,** Rhymer and McMullen. Patterson beat his hated rival, Thompson, in the 110 hurdles, running a MAC and varsity record 13.67 seconds, winning by two-hundredths. **Kevin Lawson** won both dashes, with **David Benjamin** finishing third in the 100 and second in the 200. **Carl Warren** won the steeplechase and the 5,000. EMU won the 4x400 with Asinga, **Don Johnson,** Norton and **Carl Lowe** in 3:10.38. Asinga and Lowe went 2-3 in the 400.

1996 Indoor: The Eagles hosted the first official indoor MAC Championships in 1996. Eastern won it easily with 135.5 points to WMU's 89.5 and Kent State's 85.5. **Kerch Patterson** won both the 55 and 200 meters. They won the DMR in a fairly slow time, with **Ben Reese, Tom Kessel, Mike Franko,** and **Jason Boothroyd**. Reese, Boothroyd, and **Morris Giddens** went 1-2-3 in the mile and Reese, Franko and Giddens went 1-3-4 in the 3,000 meters. **Kealoha Stokes,** Boothroyd and Derrick Jackson went 1-2-5 in the 800. They also got 4-8 in the 5,000 scoring a lot of points in the distance events. Freshman football players, **Corey Smith** and **Lional "Jelly Roll" Dalton** got 4-5 in the shotput, both with PR's. Coach Parks was named Coach of the Year, Patterson the Most Valuable performer and Reese was honored for the Most Outstanding Performance.

1997 Indoor: The 1997 MAC indoor was at Kent State on their 300m track. The Eagles won with 169 points to 131.5 for Kent State. Toledo was third with 87. **Clement Chukwu** was named the Most Valuable Performer, while **Ben Reese** was given the award for the Most Outstanding Performance and coach Parks was named Coach of the Year. Eastern won the DMR in 9:56.24 as **Clint Verran** held off CMU and WMU on the anchor leg. **Mike Franko, Fabian Rollins** and **Matt Ames** ran the first, second and third legs. They won the 4x400 easily in 3:10.89 as

Chukwu anchored in 46.10, while **Jabari Chavis**, **Herb Gibson** and Rollins ran the first through third legs for the Eagles. **Mike Spaulding** pulled a big upset, winning the 55-meter hurdles in a time of 7.32 seconds, while Reese won the mile and 3,000 and took second in the 800. Eastern went 1-3-5 in the mile with Reese, Giddens and Franko as well as 1-3-5 in the 5,000. Verran, **Lee Shaw** and **Tim Budzyn**. **Derrick Jackson** won the 800 and Franko and Giddens were 2-5 behind Reese in the 3,000. Chukwu wowed the crowd with a time of 45.77 in the 400, a new MAC and EMU record and also won the 200 in 21.08.

1997 Outdoor: Kent State hosted the 1997 outdoor meet as well as the indoor, with the temperature seemingly warmer during the indoor championships. Eastern won with 152.5 points to Toledo's 109 and Central's 105. **Ben Reese** was named the Most Valuable Performer for winning a triple- the steeplechase, 1,500 and 5,000. He and **Mike Franko** went 1-2 in the steeplechase and 1,500. **Clement Chukwu** and **Fabian Rollins** went 1-2 in the 400 and they ran the third and fourth legs on the 4x400-meter relay team that won. Chukwu anchored in a sensational 44.6. **Derrick Jackson** went out hard in the 800 meters and hung on to win. This was the 14th straight outdoor title in the event. **James Chikwe** jumped 25-3.5 for second in the long jump, his best ever and still second on the all-time list.

1998 Indoor: The 1998 MAC indoor was again at Kent State and **Clement Chukwu** broke his own records as he again won the 400 (45.37) and 200 (20.64). **Fabian Rollins** was second behind him in the 400 and fourth in the 200. They ran the third and fourth leg on the 4x400 after **Erik Lindstrom** and **Derrick Jackson**. They won the DMR for the third year in a row with **Giddens**, Lindstrom, Jackson and **Clint Verran**. Vastly improved, **Jamie Nieto**, won the high jump on misses over Mike Caza of Kent State. Nieto had only cleared 6-10 the year before in the MAC indoor. **David Seaborne** returned near his home to win the weight throw at 64-09.75, despite efforts by the Kent State throwing coach to unnerve him by closing in the throwing cage and making the center field bleachers too close. Jackson won his second straight 800 meter title. **Morris Giddens**, **Mike Franko** and Verran ran 1-2-4 in the mile and Morris and Ver-

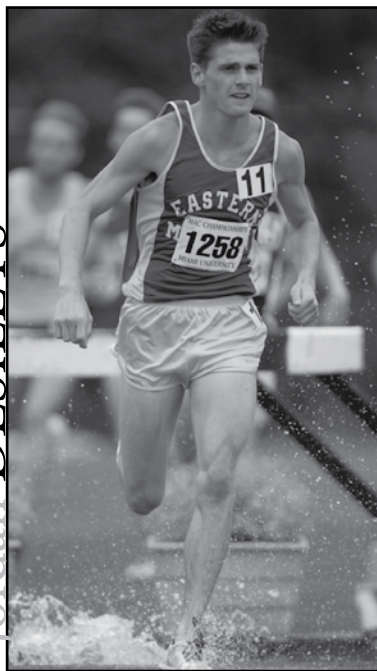


ran ran 1-2 in the 3,000-meters. Football player **Jeremy Lingenfelter** was second in the shotput. Giddens was named the Most Valuable Performer while Chukwu was awarded the Most Outstanding Performance award and coach Parks was named the Coach of the Year.

1998 Outdoor: The 1998 MAC meet was at Akron and everyone thought Kent State was going to win. **Jamie Nieto** jumped well, clearing 7-03.00, but got beaten by Mike Caza of Kent State, who went 7-04.50. Eastern was behind the whole meet to Kent State. The Eagles ended up scoring a lot at the end of the meet to win it with 171. Kent State had 142.5 and CMU had 93. With the meet on the line, Eastern went 1-2-3 in the 5,000 for 24 points with **Ben Reese**, **Clint Verran** and **Aaron Bartee**. With a lap to go, Bartee said, "Time to go, guys," and they

went. The whole field was tight to that point. The Eagles then won the 4x400 with **Fabian Rollins** and **Clement Chukwu** on the last two legs and Kent State was fourth. Verran won the 10,000 and steeplechase and was second in the 5,000 to win co-Most Valuable Performer honors. Reese won the 1,500. Eastern was 1-3-5 in the steeplechase and 800, 1-3 in the 10,000 and 1-2 in the 400. They surprised people in the 800, taking it out hard and taking the wind out of DeLong of CMU, who was doubling from the 1500. Coach Parks was named the MAC Outdoor Coach of the Year for the 12th time.

1999 Indoor: The 1999 indoor season saw the Eagles claim their third consecutive MAC title, all the while coach Parks was in a wheelchair after slipping on ice. The meet was held at BGSU, and Eastern won with 188 points to 111 for CMU and 77 for Kent State and WMU. The Chips thought they could give the Eagles a run for their money and they did, for awhile anyway. Eastern scored in everything except the weight throw, scoring 24 points in the last event, (the triple jump), to none for Central to increase the margin of victory. **Juris Vaskans**, **Garfield Wright**, and **Victor Nembhard** went 1-2-3. **Ben Reese** won the mile and 3,000 meters and anchored the winning distance medley relay for EMU. **Clement Chukwu** and **Fabian Rollins** went 1-2 in the 400, while Nembhard and Vaskins

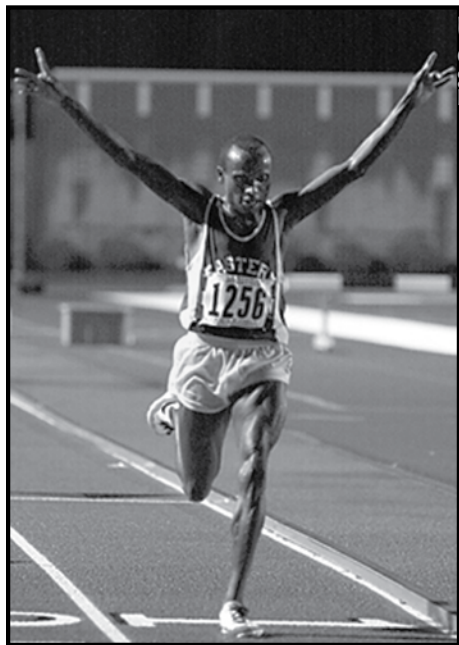

went 1-3 in the long jump and Chukwu won the 200. **Neil Kirk** won the Eagles 31st straight 800 title (indoor and outdoor). In the high jump, **Jamie Nieto** passed to 7-1 and had two misses. He made it on his third and then made 7-3 on his third to beat the Shunk brothers of Ball State.

1999 Outdoor: At Mount Pleasant, coach Parks really thought CMU could beat the Eagles, but they didn't. The 15 straight MAC 800 meter title win streak ended. **Clement Chukwu** and **Fabian Rollins** continued their 1-2 400 meter finishes. **Juris Vaskans** rose to the occasion and won the long and triple jump. **Sam Sheffer** didn't want to do decathlon, but coach Parks made him and he had a great one, scoring 7,069 to finish second. The Eagles didn't score in the throws or high jump, but got second and third finishes in a lot of other places. **Ben Reese** won the steeplechase, but got upset in 1,500, then placed in the 5,000. **Jerome Rodgers** had done nothing all year, but begged to be in the meet, so they took him and he ran 14.36 for a big PR and fifth in the 100 hurdles. Eastern won with 151 points to CMU's 136.

2000 Indoor: The Eagles hosted the 2000 indoor MAC Championship and it was coach Parks' last indoor. Eastern won with 152 to Kent State's 100 and WMU's 99.5. **Ben Reese** had a great meet, coming from far back to anchor the winning DMR, and then won the 3,000 and 5,000 to be named the Most Valuable Performer of the meet. The Eagles won the DMR by a whopping margin, despite trailing badly when Reese took the stick. **Jabari Chavis** took second in the 200 in 21.17, which qualified him for the NCAA meet. EMU went 1-2-3 in the 3,000 with Reese, **Aaron Bartee** and **Blake McDowell** and 2-3-4 in the 5,000 with McDowell, Bartee and **Steve Crane**. **Jalilu Mayo** finished in a rare tie in the 60 hurdles at 7.77.

2001 Indoor: It was held at CMU, as Eastern won easily with 168.5 points to 87 for Central and 86 for Western. EMU placed in every event. **Nduka Awazie** made his MAC debut a good one, by winning the 400, placing in the 200 and anchoring the winning 4x400-meter relay team. **Neil Kirk** won the mile, anchored the winning DMR team and placed in the 800. **Aaron Bartee** won the 3,000 and 5,000 and was named co-Most Valuable Performer. **Jalilu Mayo** won the 60 hurdles and placed in the high jump. His time of 7.79 in the hurdles was an NCAA qualifier. **Okechukwu Eziuka** won the shot put by almost three feet, hitting 60-08.50. Mayo was named the Most Valuable Performer while new head coach Brad Fairchild was named the Coach of the Year.

2001 Outdoor: The 2001 MAC outdoor meet was held in Oxford, Ohio and Eastern won the team title. The meet was held up several times by storms and torrential rain. **Aaron Bartee** was named MVP as he won the 5,000 and 10,000, both coming on good kicks at the end and beating the same Miami runner who was favored in each event. **Jalilu Mayo** won the 110 hurdles, **Okechukwu Eziuka** won the shot put and Anthony Quinn was 3rd in the decathlon with a PR 5377 points. Coach Fairchild was voted Coach of the Year.

2002 Indoor: The 2002 MAC Indoor was held in Bowen Field House on Bob Parks track and Eastern won it with 164 points to 90 for WMU and 80.5 for CMU. **Nduka Awazie** successfully defended his 400 meter crown and also finished second in the 200, as well anchoring the winning 4x4 team. **Neil Kirk** and **Jordan Desilets** went 1-2 in the mile and Kirk and **Feder Estelus** went 1-2 in the 800. **Gavin Thompson** and **Steve Crane** went 2-3 in the 3,000. EMU won the DMR with Kirk, **Brandon Jiles**, Estelus and Desilets. **Gary Stanford** was second in the 60 hurdles and long jump and also placed in the triple jump. **Anthony Quinn** was third in the heptathlon. The only event that the Eagles didn't place in was the weight throw. Kirk was named the Most Valuable Performer while coach Fairchild was named the Coach of the Year.

2002 Outdoor: The Eagles tallied 168 points en route to a 55 point victory over WMU, the 19th outdoor title for EMU. **Nduka Awazie** was named the Most Valuable Performer for winning the 200 and 400 and running on both relays. **Boaz Cheboiywo** was awarded the MAC Most Outstanding Performance for winning the 5,000 and 10,000 meters. **Jordan Desilets** won his first of what would be three steeplechase titles. The Eagles recorded victories in both the relays.

2003 Indoor: The 2003 MAC meet was held at Kent State. **Boaz Cheboiywo** made his indoor MAC debut an impressive one by winning the mile, 3,000 and 5,000 to win Most Valuable Performer. **Gavin Thompson** finished second behind Cheboiywo in the 3,000 and 5,000 and **Jordan Desilets** finished second in the mile. **Nduka Awazie** won his third straight MAC indoor 400 meter title and the Eagles won the DMR. **Anthony Quinn** took third for the second straight year in the heptathlon. Awazie anchored EMU to victory in the 4x400 and Eastern won the meet with 153.5 points, placing in every event.

2004 Indoor: The 2004 MAC indoor was held at EMU as the Eagles won their ninth consecutive title with 186

Desilets and Thompson went 1-2 in the mile and 3,000. **Tino Ngoy**, a newcomer from France, won the 60 hurdles. Desilets was named the Most Valuable Performer and Thompson the Most Outstanding Performance, while coach Fairchild was named the Coach of the Year. This was the ninth consecutive years that the Eagles won the indoor MAC title.

2006 Indoor: Eastern Michigan tallied 171 total points to capture its 10th title in the last 11 years of competi- tion. Kent State came in second (134 points) while Cen- tral Michigan finished third (124.50 points), Akron fourth (116.50 points) with Buffalo placing fifth (63 points) and Ohio sixth (46 points).

The Most Outstanding Field Performance went to EMU's **David Adamek**. Adamek broke the MAC Championship Meet record in the shot put with a throw of 61-11.00, which was an NCAA provisional mark. Head track coach Fairchild was named Coach of the Year.

On the final day of competition, the Eagles were also led by **Roy Shavers** who notched two second place fin- ishes in the 200 and 400-meter dash with times of 21.86 and 49.09 respectively. **Corey Nowitzke** took the title in the one mile run with a time of 4:08.97 while **Jake DuBois** finished first in the 800 meters with a time of 1:56.09. **Adam Kring** cleared 6-10.75 to finish second place in the high jump.

On Friday, the Eagles easily claimed victory in the dis- tance medley relay with a time of 10:00.18 ran by the team of **David Brent**, **Adrian Simmons**, Dubois and Nowitzke.

2007 Indoor: The final test of the season for the Eagles as a team was the MAC Championship. They totaled 169 points and claimed their second straight title and 11th overall. The Eagles came back from a 19-point deficit after day one to slip past conference foe Kent State by two points for the victory. **Corey Nowitzke** was named the MAC Most Valuable Per- former and head coach **Brad Fairchild** was named MAC Coach of the Year.

The Eagles broke a MAC meet records in the compe- tition. The 4x400-meter relay team of **Eric Alejandro**, **Fred Blackwell**, **Nate Blackwell**, and **Roy Shavers** turned in a time of 3:11.83 for a first place finish.

"The entire meet came down to the 4x400-meter re-

lay," said Fairchild. "The score was tied 159-159, and I told our anchor for the relay, **Roy Shavers**, that we needed to win the relay. Both Kent State and our team ran side- by-side the entire way and Roy held Kent State off for the victory."

The Eagles were victorious in six events throughout the two-day competition. **Dave Adamek** claimed top honors in the shot while **Jake DuBois** took the 800 meters. **Adam Kring** took home first in the high jump, **Josh Perrin** ran away with the mile victory and the distance medley relay team also took home a victory for the Green and White.

Eastern had four first-team All-MAC performers and four second-team All-MAC honorees. Adamek, DuBois, Perrin and Kring were all first team honorees while Alejandro, Karanja, Nowitzke and **Matt Pinter** were all named to the All-MAC second team.

2007 Outdoor: The MAC Championship saw the Eagles nip the University of Akron Zips to claim their 20th outdoor title. **Corey Nowitzke** was named the Most Valuable Per- former while **Brad Fairchild** was named the Coach of the Year.

Nowitzke won the 1,500-meters and the 3,000-meter steeplechase and finished second in the 5,000-meters. The other MAC Champion was **Dave Adamek** in the shot put.

Just as the Indoor MAC Championship was decided by the 4x400-meter relay team, (**Fred Blackwell**, **Nate Blackwell**, **Donnie Young** and **Roy Shavers**) so was the outdoor. Going into the relay, Akron had the edge with 175 points, EMU had 172 and Kent scored 170. The only way for the Eagles to win the meet was for them to win the relay and hope that another team would put Akron in third place or worse, because had the Zips finished second, the Eagles would have been defeated by one point. Shavers, the anchorman for the team, finished .73 seconds ahead of Kent, who had nipped the Zips by one-tenth of a second to put Akron in third place, thus securing the victory for the Eagles.

The Eagles had two athletes named first-team All-MAC, including Adamek and Nowitzke. The team also had **Eric Alejandro**, **David Brent**, **Josh Karanja**, **Adam Kring** and Shavers named to the All-MAC second team.

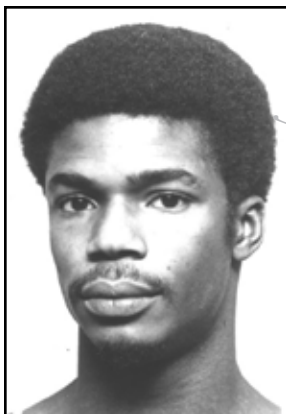
